
Ask Lineman Larry

What is a hot line tag?

Normally, Tideland breakers are in three-shot operation, which gives anything in contact with an energized line up to three opportunities to clear before a full-fledged outage begins. We refer to those operations as "blinks" because your power will typically blink off and come right back on

To work safely on energized lines, our linemen and construction crews will place a hot line tag, which includes setting the breaker in one-shot operation. During that time, something as simple a tree limb briefly touching the line will result in an immediate outage. While the hot line tag process is critical for worker safety, we know it can be frustrating to members to have an outage occur on what is otherwise a bright, beautiful day.

In 2023, when Hurricane Idalia hit Florida, there were numerous reports of close call incidents involving motorists and power restoration crews. So much so that in several cases local and state law enforcement officials were assigned to stay with crews where hazards by motorists were of greatest concern.

In fact, motorists were even pulling into work zone areas and exiting their vehicles to inquire about power restoration efforts.

In North Carolina, General Statute 20-157 states that motorists are required to move over one lane, if possible, or reduce speed for stopped emergency vehicles with flashing lights on the shoulder of the highway, including public service vehicles with amber lights. Violating the law could result in a \$250 fine.

Given that most of the roadways in Tideland served territory have minimal shoulder area, observing this law is particularly important for both your safety and ours. If you need a power restoration update the safest way to obtain that information is via our Facebook page, outage text messaging notifications or by simply giving us a call. Never interrupt crews while they work.

2025 temperature trends


You may not be playing with the thermostat but Mother Nature sure has

Outdoor temperatures are the primary driver of residential energy use. Members often ask "Why did my energy use increase when I haven't changed my thermostat setting?" Because your HVAC system likely ran longer to compensate for outdoor temperature changes.

This June, HVAC runtime requirements were 26% higher than the historical average and 9.4% higher than June 2024. For July, HVAC runtime requirements were 17% higher than the historical average and 8% higher than July 2024.

The best way to track the impact of outdoor temperatures on your home's HVAC system runtimes and overall energy consumption is to log into Tideland's member portal and overlay your daily or hourly energy consumption with the outdoor temperatures. And of course we encourage all members to sign up for a high energy use alert. Levelized billing is another option for members not challenged in meeting payment due dates.

Harvest and hurricane seasons peaking in Tideland territory

As we transition to cooler, shorter days, it's important to remember that the statistical peak of the Atlantic hurricane season is Sept. 10. That largely coincides with some of the busiest agricultural harvest periods in Tideland territory.

And what we know from past experience is that an approaching hurricane or tropical system can put tremendous pressure on our farming members to harvest as much as they can before trouble arrives. That can mean long hours and little rest for those who feed America.

Unfortunately, accidents are more prone to happen under those conditions so let's remember to put safety ahead of speed.

For our farming friends we offer the following tips:

- Know your surroundings by identifying the location of power lines and poles before you enter a new field.
- Ensure all equipment is properly maintained and that you are aware of its height, including any extensions, antennsas or GPS receivers.
- Maintain a minimum clearance of 10 feet between your equipment and power lines
- Use a spotter when raising equipment like augers or truck beds.
- Establish clear communication protocols especially for reporting an emergency.
- Always lower grain augers before moving them.
- Be mindful of your turn

radius and ensure that equipment and towed loads can't swing into poles or power lines including guy wires.

 Reach out to Tideland if you need our crews to safely lift an energized line to avoid questionnable clearances.

If farm equipment or any vehicle comes in direct contact with a power line take these steps:

- Stay inside the cab and call 911 for help.
- Make sure bystanders do not approach since the exterior of the vehicle as well as the surrounding ground may now be electrified.
- If the vehicle is on fire and you need to exit, you must jump clear of the vehicle with your feet together and hop away to safety. Under no circumstances should you touch the vehicle exterior and the ground at the same time.

Our non-farming members can do their part by giving tractors and other farm equipment wide berth as they appear more frequently on public roads during harvest season.

While our wish is for high crop yields and no named storms, those are things out of our control. What we can influence is both public and personal safety. That takes each of us doing our part.




